El Cambalache is a moneyless economy project located in San Cristóbal de las Casas, Chiapas and is made by and for women and everyone who we know. In El Cambalache everything has the same value. Here people exchange things they no longer need for things, skills, knowledge and mutual help that people want to share. El Cambalache was founded in 2015 and is based on anti-systemic and anti-capitalist values for local social movements.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Capitalism / Coloniality depends upon the normalization of racialized, hetero-patriarchal, binary ideologies forged in the structural violences of hierarchy that limit access to all that is necessary to create well-being as individuals and as collectives. The way that knowledge is created, the categories and compartmentalizations required divide what is considered knowledge from that which is considered myth, gossip, backwards, worthless, cultural anachronism, etc. implies the devaluation of all knowledge and practice that is not euro-capital-colonial-centric has required decades and generations of indoctrination, violence and dispossession to achieve. This workshop is focused on privileging and strengthening the practices and methods used to create, value, recognize, the experience / knowledge that is created through the lives and histories of people whose access to their own realities have been undermined by myriad forms of oppression, negation and gaslighting. We will look at how the persistent relationships among people, territory and non-human others have been devalued in Capitalist / Colonial systems and as such the very existence of all life is in peril. On the other hand, the persistence of relationships as relationality, comunalidad, and non-capitalist economic systems have also been the first-line of resistance, perseverance and creation of other ways of doing and being life. As scholars and activists we have a responsibility to break away from hierarchical structures of knowledge creation and practice while embracing the many forms of knowing and being that are the majority forms of existence. Let us come together in this seven-week workshop to dignify hidden and untold histories while creating futures that embrace flourishing.

FOR WHOM?

The practice, research and theories of non-capitalist social power included in this course were developed by and for all of us in order to bring about social change. For this reason, it is designed for people interested in creating, practicing and collectively researching noncapitalist and anti-colonial social power to be carried out in their places of residence or research. Everyone is invited to participate — women, people with diasporic heritages, indigenous people and LBGTIQ++ are especially invited.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

INTRODUCTION

July 12th:

Welcome and presentation of workshop participants and workshop facilitators. Explanation of the dynamics of the workshop.

WHAT IS NON-CAPITALIST / ANTI-COLONIAL SOCIAL POWER?

July 19th:

In a Capitalist economy it has been noted that money is social power; affording the possesor the possibility of purchasing just about anything including access to governance, markets, territories and the domination of other's bodies. Non-capitalist / anti-colonial social power refers to all of the forms of power that exist beyond the structures, regulations and intersectional oppressions that are inherent in the capitalist / colonial world system. When forms of knowledge, ways of being, genders, racialization, territories and myriad other forms of existence are designated as having no worth in monetary terms in a Capitalist economic system, they are treated as worthless. However, there are many forms of social power that are at play at any given time in any given geography. These forms of power are obfuscated by Capitalist systems of valuing. In this session we will look at how non-capitalist / anti-colonial social power is manifest and maintained.

RESEARCH WITHOUT OPPRESSION I: RESEARCH METHODS FOR NON-HIERARCHICAL KNOWLEDGE CREATION

July 26th:

Research and knowledge creation do not have to be imbued with extractivism and domination. It is possible to study and create knowledge that benefits social movements and communities. We will talk about examples of different techniques within Participatory

Action Research, Decolonial and Indigenous Methodologies and Experiences from within El Cambalache around creating knowledge without mistreating or dominating community members, co-investigators and / or research participants.

LEARNING FROM PRACTICE: DIGNIFYING FORMS OF KNOWLEDGE AND POWER UNDERVALUED IN CAPITALISM / COLONIALITY

August 2nd:

Value within Capitalist / Colonial systems is meted out through access to property and money and both of these resources are limited to most of the world's population through intersectional structural violence. In this session we will delve into examples of how social movements and different types of communities from the Americas practice dignity as they create knowledge and work towards dignifying the past and laying the foundations for autonomous futures that conserve culture, territory and diverse forms of knowledge.

PERSISTENT RELATIONSHIPS: COLLECTIVITY AND COMMUNALITY

August 9th:

One of the essential building blocks of non-capitalist social power is the persistence of relationships- among people through both intergenerational and contemporary relationships but also with the land, non-human others and the knowledge necessary to allow those persistent relationships to continue. We will look at how both practices in collectivity and communality support persistent relationships and relationality as forms of non-capitalist knowledge and social power.

RESEARCH WITHOUT OPPRESSION II: RESEARCH METHODS FOR NON-HIERARCHICAL KNOWLEDGE CREATION

August 16th:

In our final pedagogical session we will take a look at the different forms of research practice and knowledge creation that we have discussed throughout the workshop and deepen the conversation around the options within PAR, Decolonial and Indigenous Methodologies, our multiple shared experiences from course participants and El Cambalache around creating and dignifying non-capitalist, anti-colonial knowledge and social power.

COSTS

Cost for participants from countries with a high access to money (in US dollars)

\$500 - \$350 Solidarity price for well employed participants or collectives who want to participate with a single contribution. This price is suggested for people who have some kind of funding for their professional development or can afford it because of their high salary level. This price contributes some support to other people, with less economic possibilities of work, so that they can pay less.

\$350 - \$200 Students and participants who can afford it because they have access to some type of financing or are collectives that want to participate through a single contribution.

\$200 - \$80 Students, grassroots activists and participants who have little access to money.

Cost for participants from countries with little access to money (in Mexican pesos):

\$5,000-\$3,500 Solidarity price for well-employed participants or collectives who want to participate with a single contribution. This price is suggested for people who have some kind of funding for their professional development or can afford it because of their high salary level. By paying this price, you will contribute in supporting other people who lack economic resources or whose access is very limited, and who want to participate in the workshop, so that they can pay less. **\$3,500-\$2,000** Students and participants who can afford it because they have access to some type of financing or are collectives who want to participate through a single contribution.

\$2,000 - \$800 Students, grassroots activists and participants who have little access to money.
